Position Responsibilities:

Under the direction of the Outreach Director, the Educational Audiologist is responsible for serving students on campus and statewide through outreach support services. Duties include performing audiological evaluations, writing professional reports, providing evaluation results and consulting with parents and appropriate staff, and attending Individualized Educational Program (IEP) and Evaluation Report meetings.

The Educational Audiologist also fabricates ear molds, provides hearing aid support services, manages the school-wide FM System to meet amplification needs, assists with designing programs and services for students with cochlear implants, and provides direct functional language and communication instruction with students. This position serves as the resource person to staff, district personnel, and parents in relation to audiology and provides in-class support to teachers.

General Qualifications:

A master's degree in Audiology, proficiency in American Sign Language (ASL) and English and WA State ESA Certification.

Knowledge of audiology methods and techniques used in the diagnosis & treatment of communication disorders of hearing with may involve speech, language, and other disorders.

Experience working with students including implementing IEPs, collaborating with an educational team, maintaining records, and preparing reports and correspondence preferred.
