



The board meeting was called to order by Char Parsley, chair, at 9:45 a.m. It was determined a quorum was present.

**Approval of meeting minutes**

Nancy Fitta moved to approve the March 9, 2018, meeting minutes. Sidney Weldele-Wallace seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and approved.

**Welcome Tsering Cornell**

Welcome to our new legal counsel, Tsering Cornell. We all look forward to working with you. Also, the Board would like to thank Kim Witherspoon and Jennifer Mankowski-Dixon for their support of the Board these past few months.

**Board Finance Committee**

CDHL will end the fiscal year with a small balance. Monies are still coming in for outreach services and will be applied to the 19H fund.

Three projects are underway:

- Key card system replacement: In process of selecting an installation contractor. The project should be completed shortly after the start of the 2018/2019 school year.

- Divine Hall roof replacement: The appropriation for this project has been received. Once a contractor has been selected, work will begin.
- Demolition of old buildings and pre-design for a new academic building: This work must be done prior to June 30, 2019. Working with WSDAA (Washington School for the Deaf Alumni Association and the Washington State Archives to preserve the history of these buildings. Epperson will be the first building to be demolished.

### **Rick Hauan, Executive Director**

CEASD/OPTION recently held a historic joint conference in St. Augustine, Florida. Almost 300 participants from all over the U.S. attended. The conference included a variety of presentations, which focused on the needs of DHH students regardless of communication modalities. The conference was a great start in bringing people together to ensure the best possible education for DHH students throughout the country.

The superintendent wanted to recognize the executive director for making this conference possible by writing the grant to secure the necessary funds.

### **Shauna Bilyeu, Superintendent**

- Prom was held last night at the Water Resource Center. The students and staff had a great time!
- The last FAN (Family Academy Night) was held on Wednesday, May 9<sup>th</sup>. The participants enjoyed a BBQ and “Amazing Race” type competition.
- Deafopia was held on the WSD campus on Saturday, May 12. Over 450 people attended this one-day event. WSD students held two fundraisers during the day; pancake breakfast and selling pizza at lunchtime. Thanks to Lee Ellis, administrative assistant/facilities department, for spending the entire day on campus to ensure that everything went smoothly. Thanks also to Paper Tiger for donating all the coffee for the pancake breakfast and Blind Onion for their donation of 18 pizzas for the lunchtime fundraiser. It was a fun and exciting day!

Note: Board member, Nancy Sinkovitz, will prepare a letter of thanks to Paper Tiger and Blind Onion for their donations and continued support of WSD.

- WSD is hosting a sports summer camp this year. D.E.A.F. (Deaf Education Advocacy Foundation) donated \$10,000 to kick off the camp and we are very grateful for their generous donation. Future summer camps could include drama and transition.
- “Every Student Succeed Act” report card is posted on the OSPI website. Graduation rates are based on four years of high school. The superintendent is working with OSPI to make sure our information is clarified as many of our students attend high school for more than four years. CDHL/WSD is eligible for grant money for additional support and technology.

### **Tom Galey, Director of Business Operations & Technology**

Kathy Froleich, contract specialist, has joined the business office team. Kathy came to us from the Department of Corrections, working in the business office at Larch Mountain Correctional Facility. She has extensive experience with state systems, procurement and contracts.

The business office will be fully staffed once the new Fiscal Analyst 1 starts on July 16<sup>th</sup>.

### **Outreach information**

- CDHL's Statewide Outreach Team is serving over 20 students in the northwest interior region, which extends from the Canadian border to the Everett area. Due to the increased number of students in this area, CDHL is exploring staffing possibilities. Kris Ching, outreach director, and Kerianne Christie, early invention specialist, have done a tremendous job working with LEAs (Local Education Agency) and FRCs (Family Resource Center) throughout the state.
- Family Camp, held last weekend, had 212 people in attendance; including 17 babies. A language immersion day was added and feedback was very positive.
- Deaf Fiesta started with 12 people several years ago and this year 72 Hispanic children and their families came from across the state to attend this weekend event held in Ellensburg.
- BizTown was a tremendous success. Students and staff from Idaho, Iowa, Alaska, Oregon and Montana attended. Many schools want to duplicate the BizTown/Finance Park program in their state. Thanks to the Board members who attended and a special thanks to Cathy Corrado for organizing this very successful event. Cathy and Laura Gramer (a Seattle area parent) will give a presentation regarding BizTown/Finance Park at the ASDC (American Society for Deaf Children) conference in June.

### **Student Activity – CEASD's Education and Advocacy Summit – students visit to Washington, D.C.**

WSD students, Estasha Stone (junior), Ashanty Truong (junior) and Taylor Payne (senior), along with the superintendent and Piper Gallucci (social studies teacher) flew to Washington, D.C. to attend CEASD's Education and Advocacy Summit and meet with Washington state legislators.

The students and staff attended an intensive training at Gallaudet University to learn how to approach legislators to explain the importance of a proposed bill called the Cogswell-Macy Act. The group met with Washington state Senators Maria Cantwell and Patty Murray. They also had the opportunity to visit many Washington, D.C. sites; including the National Museum of African American History and Culture, United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, and Korean War Veterans Memorial.

The students were asked what influenced them the most and this is what they had to say:

- Meeting with Senator Maria Cantwell, as she does not want deaf education funding cut.
- Visiting the National Museum of African American History and Culture
- Visiting Washington, D.C. – it is very big and has many visual sights.

## **Travel - policy 6213 (2<sup>nd</sup> reading)**

Sidney Weldele-Wallace moved to adopt policy 6213 – Travel. Rita Reandeau seconded the motion. It was voted on and approved.

## **July 1<sup>st</sup> report – RCW 72.42.041(6)**

The above law says that CDHL’s Board of Trustees “Shall prepare and submit by July 1st of each even-numbered year a report to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature which contains a detailed summary of the center's progress on performance objectives and the center's work, facility conditions, and revenues and costs of the center for the previous year and which contains those recommendations it deems necessary and advisable for the governor and the legislature to act on;”

**What activities/projects have you been doing since our last meeting?**

**May 2018**

- Meeting with Georgia Pathway (Atlanta)
  - Set future training for Carol, Kris and Rick to attend for Language to Literacy with the intent to bring this new research-based curriculum to Washington State. The Georgia Department of Education has been providing training and materials to their teachers for more than a year.
  - Facilitated a team meeting for the implementation of Language to Literacy bill with the goal of bringing that resource to WA
- Attended NWESD 101 (Spokane) Special Education Directors meeting
- Attended ESD 123 (Pasco) Special Education Directors meeting
- Met with Director of Special Education for ESD 123 regarding staffing issues for D/HH Program in Pasco School District
  - CDHL has been asked to identify supports available under contract with Pasco School District for the regional program located in their district serving South Central Washington
- Met with ODHH's Director regarding Lead-K
  - Discussed next steps relating to the development and implementation of a Language to Literacy Lead-K bill
- Met with WSSB's Superintendent to discuss outreach rates for next school year
  - CDHL, WSSB and WSDS will be increasing service rates based on \$685 per day. Hourly rates and early intervention rates will be adjusted to be in alignment with the new fee structure

  - WSDS and CDHL are working with OSPI and PESB to develop guidance relating to RCW 28a.410.271 relating to interpreter standards for classroom-based interpreters.

**Events**

**All Star Day:** Elementary and Secondary departments pulled off another successful annual event. Elementary and secondary held their awards programs on May 31<sup>st</sup>. Both elementary and secondary departments attended a presentation by Calvin Young, a deaf travel blogger that day. He shared stories of his many adventures and was a very inspirational speaker. He spoke to the students about following their dreams and how to achieve them. It was a great way to kick off the awards and end of year season celebrations. Secondary students showed off projects and senior presentations to staff, students and families throughout the day. It was truly a day of seeing our students shine.

**Sports Highlights:** For the third year in a row, WSD sent athletes to Cheney, Washington for the 1B State Track and Field Championships at Eastern Washington University over Memorial Day weekend. We sent 8 athletes in 9 events. Junior Cristian Martinez-White made it through qualifying placed in both events that he qualified in: the 200 and 400 meter dashes. **What have you been doing since our last meeting?**

- April 12: Meet & Greet Home Visits for 2 new families in Oak Harbor
- April 13: Meet & Greet Home Visits for 2 families other new families in Oak Harbor
  - Toddler Learning Center, the Local Lead Agency (LLA) for Island County is now referring all their birth-3 D/HH children and families to CDHL. Kerianne Christie is now serving 7 families in Oak Harbor. She is serving most of Whatcom, Skagit, and Island counties now. Starting last school year, she was providing home visit services for 3 families in the Sedro Woolley SD – this year her birth-3 case load has grown to 17 families in that tri-county region! The plan is to hire a local person – early childhood TOD, to serve that area as Kerianne travels up to the upper NW corner of the state regularly. She does virtual videoconference home visits with several families, but also see them in person.

- April 19: Kris & Kerianne meet with Krissy Walker, the new Family Engagement Specialist (starting July 1) for planning

Next year we will need to budget better as CDHL typically offers a \$200 scholarship to families who have infants and toddlers who are D/HH. We are considering offering the scholarship to families new to camp only next year.

***What activities/projects have you been doing since our last meeting?***

*May 1 – 2 Consulted in Walla Walla SD regarding a student with severe behavior needs, along with Gabriela and Erica.*

*May 4-6 Family Camp. This event gets better every year. We had a total of 212 people at camp. This year we held an ASL Immersion day on Friday, 85 people signed up. It was a huge success and will continue. Some of the comments about camp this year were:*

We love and treasure this community so very much! Anyhow, I just wanted to make sure that you knew what a positive impact you had on my daughter (and I imagine on the others in your group too!!)! Thanks again and take good care”*

*May 8<sup>th</sup> WSDS meeting at WSSB. Our topic focused on data collection. Glenna Gallo, State Special Education Director/Assistant Superintendent, wants us to focus on what data we are collecting and if we are collecting all that we need.*

*May 10<sup>th</sup> Outreach meeting at Willard. Topics discussed: New hires Kathy Froehlich Business office and Haley Brown Itinerant teacher Issaquah Coop. Presentations from*

*Audiologists and Speech Language Therapists for Better Speech and Hearing Month. Rick, CEASD conference, Erica and Julie National Outreach conference and Susan IECC meeting.*

*May 11<sup>th</sup> Participated in practice interviews for Spokane Falls Interpreter Training Students. Interviewed 5 students who will graduate in June.*

*May 15<sup>th</sup> Provided a consult with Jane Tabor (via zoom) for Cle Elum School District. The district had purchased new equipment and wanted to make sure they were using it correctly.*

*May 16<sup>th</sup> Attended Special Education Director meeting ESD 105.*

*May 16<sup>th</sup> Attended Special Education director meeting ESD 123 continued to meet with Pasco School district with Rick and Kris. Topic: How we can provide more support for their dhh program next year.*

*May 23 Consulted with Nespalem SD about new deaf student, provided resource materials. It is the hope of the district this student will attend WSD in the fall.*

*May 25<sup>th</sup> Video meeting with Highline SD. CDHL recently conducted several 3 year evaluations and noticed some less than desirable results. The data was recorded in the report but we decided to call the special education director and verbally explain our concerns. We all thought we should do this more often so the Director hears verbally and doesn't just read it in a report, which may not result in changes. One concern was a student in the preschool who made minimal language gains in the last 2 years, the other in the high school, the amount of spoken English happening by all in the room when deaf students were in the room.*

*May 29<sup>th</sup> Rick, Kris and I met with Michael Dickneite at TOPS in Seattle for a full day visit to each classroom. Seattle's DHH program has improved greatly from the time of our evaluation several years ago. The K-2 classroom had a lot of lively discussion about a story Seth read to them. Students would easily code switch, signing in the classroom and we saw them leave the classroom and use spoken English. The new teacher at the high school was doing an excellent job as well.*

*May 31 David Brenna, Brent Stark, Karen Mool (SPED Director in Puyallup) Rick and I met with Glenna Gallo about guidance for the educational interpreter standard requirement. It was an excellent discussion with many very positive outcomes possible. Glenna will draft a guidance paper, to be circulated among us and sent out to directors in the fall.*

*May and June Christy and I continue to provide the EIPA performance and the written evaluations to those who register.*

*June 5 State Transition Committee meeting at Willard.*






