It's hard to believe that yet another year has gone by. This year has been extra special as we watched the new Divine Academic building and new Hunter Gym go up. Time Flies and Flying Hands

Whoa.... The school year has flown by. As I write this, we are in our last day of school for this year. During April our elementary Terrier Pups were busy reading, reading, reading... April was our 500 Books challenge. In our elementary program we challenge our students to read 500 books in the month. As a reward for their eager reading they experienced several end-of-the-year field trips. Our younger students went to Dizzy Castle for a fun-filled couple of hours. Our middle elementary students visited the OMSI to view the exhibit on Dinosaurs and our 4-6th grade classes walked to the nearby Crosby Bowling Lanes to enjoy some friendly bowling competition. Unrelated to 500 Books, our PE teacher, Caleb Hinton, took our K - 4th graders to the Oregon School for the Deaf for a field day and friendly competition between our two schools.

Flying Hands

Our elementary Terrier Pups participated on April 18th in our annual Flying Hands competition. This event saw teams from around the state of Washington as well as British Columbia, Canada. Terrier Pups represented WSD well bringing home several 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place medals. Flying Hands is an opportunity for our students to be creative with ASL. For a month prior to this competition students are working on their short presentations. In the process they are thinking about how ASL works as a language. These meta-cognitive skills developed while thinking about ASL translate to their overall language development in ASL and English.

Attendance Matters!

Please be aware that it is very important to emphasize regular attendance with your children. Attendance matters! The habit of attending school needs to be instilled in children in the earliest grades and throughout elementary. Please make school a priority in your family. Schedule doctor appointments as much as possible outside of school hours. Don't schedule family trips and vacations when school is in session. Doing so sends a subtle message that attending school isn't that important. There is a direct relationship between school attendance in elementary grades, successful graduation, and future earning power. 
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

Also, every year parents/guardians and students must sign and date the concussion form indicating that they have reviewed and understand the concussion information provided before the student participates in any sports. (Health packets will be mailed out midsummer)

Per state law, 8th through 12th grade students cannot participate in sports related activities until the Concussion Letter is signed, the student is cleared by their doctor, and the physical form is completed and received by the SHC. Thank you!

Schools nationwide have experienced a drop in attendance since the COVID lockdown. Students can't learn if they are not in school. WSD is no exception, so student attendance was a focus this school year. The results have been positive. This year there has been noticed a steady increase in student attendance at both the elementary and secondary departments. For the month of April, the percentage of students absent one or fewer school days is 89% in the secondary school and 90% in the elementary school. We applaud you, the parents, for your work to ensure your child is in school.

The secondary department implemented the Academic Level System, based on the residential model. Students in grades 7th-12th who are successful in academics, attendance, and behavior have opportunities to achieve Honor or Gold level. This isn't just a recognition of their achievements but also a gateway to extra privileges tailored to their grade level. This system will not only motivate our students but also enhance their academic journey. This program will continue next year.
