Dear Terrier Families,

Happy Spring! I sent home a letter March 8th outlining the changes in school guidance as they relate to the expired masking mandates in school. We are excited to move forward with optional masking because it will allow for better communication access for both staff and students. The only masking required is for students and staff riding charter buses through mid-April and students and staff entering the Student Health Center on campus. There is no longer a 3 foot/6 foot rule for physical distancing in place; however we continue to monitor ventilation and adhere to strict cleaning procedures as required by the Department of Health. Additionally, we are still required to offer testing to individuals who have been potentially exposed to COVID and to do limited contact tracing. 

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Measures of Academic Progress (MAP)

MAP is one tool we use to measure your child's academic progress in reading, language use, math, and science. We administered fall testing in October. Spring testing begins mid-March. Students will complete two of the four test sessions during the week of March 14 and the remaining two test sessions in the following week (March 21). Test completion time ranges from 30 to 60 minutes.

This can be a stressful time for your child. Make sure your child is rested and has a good breakfast on scheduled test days. Please encourage your child to do their best. If you want more information on MAP, check out the parent toolkit (see link below) or reach out to me.

FROM THE SCHOOL NURSE

PARENTS OF SIXTH GRADE STUDENTS: It is not too early to start planning to update your student's immunizations. Washington State requires a Tdap booster to be given after the eleventh birthday and before entering seventh grade to be able to attend school. Don't wait until summer, beat the rush, and help your student transition into seventh grade smoothly. Make a well-child appointment for immunization after their eleventh birthday so they are ready to start school in the fall. Records can be faxed to the Student Health Center (SHC) (360) 418-4383.
