From the Superintendent's Desk Shauna Bilyeu, Interim Executive Director, Superintendent Dear Terrier Families and Friends,

Welcome to March! It hardly seems possible that we are almost two thirds of the way through the school year. There are lots of exciting things going on all over campus!

We continue to make progress and stay on track with the new Divine Academic Building and Hunter Gym. They are set to be completed in time for the new school year. School will start one week later than usual to give staff time to unpack: September 3rd is the first day of school. The full 2024-2025 school year calendar is posted on our website and on our Parent Square website. Pictures of the new buildings are in this newsletter—take a peek!

In addition to the New Divine and Hunter Gym, we are in the process of designing an updated Northrop Elementary School. As you may recall, Northrop is designated as a Historic Building and so will never be demolished, however the interior is quite outdated and inefficient. are working with Bassetti Architects to develop a state-of-the-art Parent Welcome Center and Birth-to 5 service centers. Northrop will continue to house preschool, our PT/OT room, audiology and the WSDAA Museum. We received legislative funding for design work and will submit a request for construction work this fall. Parents will be given the opportunity to view the floor plan and hear from the design team at the March 26th PSO meeting. If approved, work will begin July 2025.

Students and staff celebrated WSD's 138th birthday on February 1st by seeing the plans for the new playground. Construction for Despo's Playground (named in honor of one of the longest working teachers in WSD History—Despo Varkados) begins this March. A huge thank you to Deaf Education Advocates Foundation for fundraising and our PSO for input on the inclusive design. To say the students are excited is an understatement!

I am very proud of our Terriers—we have no less than three different teams heading on to various competitions throughout the state and region: Our Special Olympics basketball team is competing at the state level, our middle school math team is flying to Rochester, New York for Nationals, and our high school Academic Bowl team is going to Gallaudet for Nationals! None of this would have happened without the dedication and commitment of our staff and support from parents. You make our school special!

As we head into the final few months of school, there will be many special events—please make sure we have your most current contact information and if you haven't already, please make sure to bookmark the WSD Parent Square website. This event provides a unique opportunity for students to connect with their deaf peers and acquire valuable information on life beyond high school.
