I believe staff and students are also looking ahead to warmer months and end of school year celebrations. We will soon be nearing the end of the 3rd quarter and rushing headlong into the flurry of 4th quarter activities.

Parents may have seen a recent post on social media regarding recruitment for a new principal. Do not worry! Our administration is intact—mostly. We will say farewell to our beloved former principal, elementary principal and current assistant director for admissions, Bill Newell, in June. After retiring twice from WSD, Bill is leaving us for a 3rd and final time to enjoy some well-deserved rest. This, along with my decision to retain some superintendent duties in my role as executive director, prompted us to do some restructuring at the administrative level. Beginning next school year, Dr. Shannon Graham will assume the role of director of instruction and oversee the academic department as well as WSD special education processes and admissions. Piper Gallucci will maintain her role as assistant principal, and we are currently recruiting a principal. We will share information with parents and families regarding finalists for this critical role later this spring. We hope to have a new principal in place in time for the start of the 2025-2026 school year.

This year's theme is "Imagination in the Wild: Deaf Animal Kingdom."

We still have several capital projects occurring or wrapping up around campus. Here is the rundown:

- Jim's Soccer Field: our beautiful turf field is almost complete! We are scheduled to open it after spring break! There will be a small dedication ceremony on April 9th for staff and students only.
- Kastel STEM Lab: construction is set to begin late April/early May. Students will have robotics, esports, and other STEM-related courses in this state-of-the art classroom next fall! Construction is expected to be completed before school starts August 25th.
- Clarke Hall Bilyeu Conference room: we are remodeling this room to be better suited for meetings with technology and lighting upgrades. Work is expected to be completed by June 2025.
- Northrop Primary School: this building will be completely renovated, pending legislation approval. If approved, work will begin in July 2025 and be completed by August 2026.

There are a lot of changes happening at the federal level with the new administration. While we do receive some federal funding, we are primarily state funded. Currently, I do not anticipate interruptions to our programs. If things should change, I will alert families.

However, Washington State is experiencing a revenue shortfall, and the budget projections are not promising. Governor Bob Ferguson has repeatedly said that schools will be protected from any budget cuts. I will know more about what the potential impacts could look like for our school later this spring. I will share information as I have it. I am cautiously optimistic that our programs will be sheltered. Make sure to watch the Parent Square calendar and notifications for news about our upcoming events! I hope you can dodge those raindrops and get outside to enjoy the spring!

April 8th to 17th, all students from 3rd-8th and 10th grades will take the Smarter Balanced Assessment (SBA) in Math and English on a computer (iPads for elementary & ChromeBooks for secondary). 5th, 8th, & 11th graders will also take a science test, known as the Washington Comprehensive Assessment of Science (WCAS).

Understanding Cyberbullying

Bullying is a serious issue that can have lasting effects on children. It is defined as repetitive insults and comments that interfere with a student's education and cause pain and/or fear. In today's digital age, cyberbullying has become the most frequent type of bullying, occurring through texting, group texts, and social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram Live, and Snapchat. Most cyberbullying takes place in the evenings and on weekends, making parental involvement crucial.

What Can Parents/Guardians Do?

- Regularly check your child's social media accounts and online interactions.
- Use parental control apps like Boomerang or consult your cell phone provider about monitoring options.
- Have open and honest discussions with your child about responsible social media use.
- Reinforce the importance of reporting concerning content.
- Discuss the consequences of engaging in or spreading inappropriate posts.
- If your child reports cyberbullying to you, there are some things you can do:
- Have your child show you the message(s).
- Educate your child on how to disengage from unhealthy texting and online messages.
- Inform the assistant principal.
