Happy New Year Terrier Families and Friends!

Never has a new year been met with such anticipation and hope! As I begin to think about all of the possibilities for 2021, I have to remind myself to be patient and that good things come to those who wait. WSD staff is more than ready to welcome back students, but we must plan carefully in order to ensure everyone's safety. As you know, we are only offering remote operations for grades 2-12 at this time. We will continue to engage in discussions with both local and state level departments of health on how to start bringing students back. I hope to have more re-opening information for you before the end of January. Our campus de-construction project is moving slowly, but surely forward. Four buildings are slated for demolishment: Epperson Vocational Building, the Old Red Barn, the Old Cafeteria, and the Boiler House. Underground utilities reports and permit applications to the city are complete. The actual demolishment will occur mid-April, and we hope to have everything complete (including site restoration) by July of 2021. In related big news, phase 2, which is the construction of a new academic building is included in the Governor's budget! It still has to pass in the House and Senate this spring, so it is not definite, but it is a good first step. We are highly encouraged.

We also learned that the governor did NOT include an operating 15% budget reduction for the next biennium. This is VERY good news, and affirms that the governor values our school and community. We will continue to share information as we have it.

2020 was certainly a roller coaster of mostly lows. My hope is that 2021 is mostly the highs as we climb back up from loss, uncertainty and fear. We still have a long way to go, but we will get there, slowly, but surely. I am grateful for your continued trust. We will continue to serve your children in the best way we know how. Please feel free to email me with questions or concerns.

What is Anti-bias Education?

Children have a right to an education that allows them to achieve to their fullest potential. A strong bilingual program, such as the Washington School for the Deaf provides, is one avenue to supporting the child's development of their full potential. Anti-bias education is another avenue which ensures all students an equitable learning environment, but what is antibias education?

Anti-bias education (ABE) is not simply a curriculum. Rather, ABE is a systematic approach to an education. In a world that is diverse and inequitable, ABE provides a perspective and framework integrated into each part of the school's system. It supports each child through equitable education, social interaction, district decisions, and classroom instructional methods, materials and more.

With an equitable education system children learn a strong sense of identity about themselves and family. Thev recognize and honor diversity, recognize hurtful behaviors, and actively work to build an inclusive and fair world. ABE starts in early childhood education and continues until the child graduates.

This is no small feat. We, at WSD, recognize that this is a road to where there is no end. We have a lot to learn and look forward to a journey of discovery and growth for our school community and a supportive, equitable learning environment for our students.
