### **Terrier Systems of Support**

At the Washington School for the Deaf we recognize that a child's socialemotional health is crucial for their academic success. We recognize students have diverse needs and that "one size does not fit all" when it comes to academic achievement and social success. The Multi-Tiered System of Supports (MTSS) is a framework many school districts use. This includes the Washington School for the Deaf. Included in our MTSS framework are: Trauma-Informed approaches (TI), Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBID), Bully Prevention, Anti-Bias Education (ABE), and more.

PBIS is a school-wide approach that provides a framework of school-wide expectations and recognitions. Students are taught expectations at the beginning of the school year and review these expectations as needed. Students are recognized daily for their success. More formal recognition includes the Friday assemblies in the elementary department and Student of the Month assemblies in the secondary department.

#### Residential Department
